(Knoxville, TN) In 1956, twelve courageous young students made history when they walked into Clinton High School, making it the first state-supported public high school in the Southeast to desegregate. The community's initially constructive approach was marred by the violence and strife incited by outside agitators, a storm quelled only by the calling of the National Guard. In a Brown Bag Lecture on Wednesday, March 1, Jerry Shattuck, then president of the Clinton High School student council and captain of the football team, will discuss the inspiring story of how the black and white communities and religious leaders came together to foster a successful transition, a story commemorated today at the Green McAdoo Cultural Center and Museum.
